Welcome to M150: Beginning Italian II Online Course. This course focuses on developing students' competency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. M150 will be held entirely online. You will not need to be physically present on campus in order to be a student in this class. You will use the Textbook *Sentieri* published by Vista Higher Learning and the Supersite. You will need to purchase access to Supersite with your textbook, and activate your Adobe Connect account (available for Indiana University students for free). Since the course will be held entirely online it requires students **to work independently and follow a very structured syllabus**. Each day you will be involved in a variety of online tasks such as reading, listening, completing exercises, posting writing assignments and recording responses on the Supersite. Twice a week during our virtual classroom time, you will meet with your instructors and a small number of classmates on Zoom. Your instructors will be available for online office hours twice a week.

Course Structure & Policies

1. Virtual Classroom

Once a week: Thursday, either 9:30-10:45 am or 7:15-8:30 pm, upi will log in to Zoom to meet with your instructor and other students. You need to make the decision which meeting time works best for you and follow that time throughout the course. Occasional changes are possible, but the instructor needs to be aware of how many students are going to attend each session. Please, bring a current picture ID to the first Virtual Class meeting.

The Virtual classroom is for practicing speaking skills. The instructor will address the grammar in very concise fashion. It is your responsibility to study and learn the grammar before coming to class. Do not forget: it is an ONLINE course.

You are allowed ONE excused absence. Each absence beyond the allowed one will lower your final grade by 4%. **It is your responsibility to provide the medical note to your instructor within a week of your absence. The note must state that you were unable to attend class due to illness (neither in the morning nor in the evening).** During online meetings you need to speak Italian, participate and have fun.

2. **Office Hours:** The instructor will hold office hours (using Zoom or in person – if requested). If you are on campus, you can set up a face to face appointment with your instructor.
3. **Mini Lectures:** You will be asked to watch mini lectures that will be posted on Canvas. These lectures cover the most demanding grammar points, give you more opportunity to practice, and provide you with the real classroom experience. After watching the lecture you will have to take a short Canvas quiz which will allow you to check if you understand the material (these quizzes are mandatory and they are part of your grade).
4. **Homework:** Homework will be due once a week and will include activities from the *Supersite*. *Supersite* work is worth 20% of your final grade and it is essential to complete the homework in order to be successful in this class. The computer graded assignments are for credit only and they will constitute 70% of your grade; the instructor graded activities will be for a grade and they will constitute 30% of your grade. We reserve the right to reset any activities if we notice that you do not put your best effort into your work. For each day after the due date you will lose 10% of the grade for the late assignment. **YOU SHOULD DO**

YOUR HOMEWORK EVERY NIGHT, IF YOU WAIT FOR THE EVENING IT IS DUE YOU, WILL GET FRUSTRATED AND DO NOT FINISH IT.

5. **Participation:** Although this is an online course, presence and participation in Virtual Class is mandatory and it is part of your grade. During online meetings you need to speak Italian, participate and have fun. **The Virtual classroom is for practicing speaking skills.** The instructor will address the grammar in very concise fashion. It is your responsibility to study and learn the grammar before coming to class. Do not forget: it is an ONLINE course.
6. **Exams:** You will take three chapter exams and one final exam in this class. All of these exams are going to be online and you will have to take them during Virtual Class meetings (dates on the syllabus) with your video camera turned on. You are not allowed to use any help during the exams.
7. **Writings:** You will write three essays during the semester and you will submit them through email. The instructor will give you feedback and you will have to re-write both essays, making appropriate corrections. The second essay is going to be a base for your final oral presentation.
8. **9 Videotaped Diaries:** you will have a topic assigned and you will be asked to make a 3-4 minutes video recording on the topic. The video recordings are due Saturday at 10pm. You will have a classmate assigned for each of the project and you will have to watch your classmate's video, correct possible mistakes and be ready to summarize it during the virtual classroom. No reading allowed.
9. **Final oral exam:** For this assignment you will have to meet with your instructor and speak for 15 minutes. The instructor will ask you several questions regarding the use of the vocabulary and structures you have learned during the semester. In order to prepare for this exam you must: study regularly, participate into virtual classroom, memorize and review structures and vocabulary learned during the semester.

1. Cheating

Learning Goals and Objectives:

This course follows M100 and continues to present the beginning-level concepts of Italian language, and culture. Students will partake in a variety of assignments and activities designed to increase knowledge, build proficiency, develop greater cultural awareness. If you study and participate in class, by the end of this course you will be able to:

- (1) listen to and comprehend more complex, first-year audio and video texts;
- (2) speak in the present, future and past tenses with accuracy and fluency, employing basic conversational strategies to ask and answer questions with complete sentences and tell short and simple stories;
- (3) read gradually more complex and varied first-year Italian language texts from a different sources (textbooks, literary excerpts, newspapers, websites, magazines, etc.);

(4) write in Italian with accuracy and coherency using your growing vocabulary and knowledge of structures on a range of familiar topics and in different contexts and for different purposes;

(5) demonstrate cultural knowledge (facts) and understanding (ability to conduct simple analyses and comparisons) on different topics and issues related to daily living, regional geography, and aspects of Italian high culture as presented and discussed in class.

Our hope is that your enthusiasm and confidence will grow steadily and we look forward to helping you reach these goals.
